# YEAR-ROUND BEAUTY

With plantings as lush as these, you'd never miss the lawn that once covered this Roseville, California, backyard (above). Landscape designer Roberta Walker packed the beds with colorful textural and blooming perennials including silvery Artemisia 'Powis Castle', chartreuse Coleonema 'Sunset Gold', white-striped 'Cosmopolitan' eulalia grass, lavender, pale blue–flowered plumbago, structured 'Thunderhead' pine, and wispy Mexican weeping

bamboo. The best part?
These showy plants need
minimal water and practically no maintenance.

it," Roberta says.

#### To-do list

- ☐ For color in a sunny spot, try compact *Echinacea purpurea* 'Sombrero Hot Pink', which tops out at just 21 inches.
- ☐ When you plant coolseason vegetables this month, include two new kale hybrids: 'Petit Posy' resembles brussels sprouts but has kale florets instead of sprouts, and 'Purple Peacock' produces broccoli heads and kalelike leaves.
- ☐ Hoe weeds before they go to seed and replicate themselves.
- ☐ Keep caterpillars from eating your crops by applying Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt) in the late afternoon or under cloudy weather (it breaks down in sunshine). It won't harm beneficial insects.
- ☐ Keep harvesting your edibles. Frequent picking discourages rot and encourages continued production.
